**SURFACE TRANSPORTATION BOARD**

**Indiana Rail Road Company—Abandonment Exemption—in Vigo County, Ind.**

Indiana Rail Road Company (INDR) has filed a verified notice of exemption under 49 CFR part 1152 subpart F—*Exempt Abandonments* to abandon an approximately 5.92-mile rail line known

as the Riley Spur, extending between milepost 6.48 and the end of the track at milepost 12.4 (near Riley) in Vigo County, Ind. (the Line). The Line traverses U.S. Postal Service Zip Code 47802 and has one station, Chinook (FSAC 40956/OPSL 21009), which INRD states can be closed.

INDR has certified that: (1) No local traffic has moved over the Line for at least two years; (2) any overhead traffic can be rerouted over other lines; (3) no formal complaint filed by a user of rail service on the Line (or by a state or local government entity acting on behalf of such user) regarding cessation of service over the Line either is pending with the Surface Transportation Board (Board) or with any U.S. District Court or has been decided in favor of a complainant within the two-year period; and (4) the requirements at 49 CFR 1105.7 and 1105.8 (notice of environmental and historic report), 49 CFR 1105.12 (newspaper publication), and 49 CFR 1152.50(d)(1) (notice to governmental agencies) have been met.

As a condition to this exemption, any employee adversely affected by the abandonment shall be protected under *Oregon Short Line Railroad—Abandonment Portion Goshen Branch Between Firth & Ammon, in Bingham & Bonneville Counties, Idaho*, 360 I.C.C. 91 (1979). To address whether this condition adequately protects affected employees, a petition for partial revocation under 49 U.S.C. 10502(d) must be filed.

Provided no formal expression of intent to file an offer of financial assistance (OFA) has been received,<sup>1</sup> the exemption will be effective on June 10, 2021, unless stayed pending reconsideration. Petitions to stay that do not involve environmental issues,<sup>2</sup> formal expressions of intent to file an OFA under 49 CFR 1152.27(c)(2), and interim trail use/rail banking requests under 49 CFR 1152.29 must be filed by May 21, 2021.<sup>3</sup> Petitions to reopen or requests for public use conditions under

49 CFR 1152.28 must be filed by June 1, 2021.

All pleadings, referring to Docket No. AB 295 (Sub-No. 10X), should be filed with the Surface Transportation Board via e-filing on the Board’s website. In addition, a copy of each pleading must be served on INDR’s representative, Louis E. Gitomer, Law Offices of Louis E. Gitomer, LLC, 600 Baltimore Avenue, Suite 301, Towson, MD 21204.

If the verified notice contains false or misleading information, the exemption is void ab initio.

INDR has filed a combined environmental and historic report that addresses the potential effects, if any, of the abandonment on the environment and historic resources. OEA will issue a Draft Environmental Assessment (Draft EA) by May 14, 2021. The Draft EA will be available to interested persons on the Board’s website, by writing to OEA, or by calling OEA at (202) 245–0305. Assistance for the hearing impaired is available through the Federal Relay Service at (800) 877–8339. Comments on environmental and historic preservation matters must be filed within 15 days after the Draft EA becomes available to the public.

Environmental, historic preservation, public use, or interim trail use/rail banking conditions will be imposed, where appropriate, in a subsequent decision.

Pursuant to the provisions of 49 CFR 1152.29(e)(2), CSXT shall file a notice of consummation with the Board to signify that it has exercised the authority granted and fully abandoned the Line. If consummation has not been effected by INDR’s filing of a notice of consummation by May 11, 2022, and there are no legal or regulatory barriers to consummation, the authority to abandon will automatically expire.

**ACTION:** Notice of intent.

**SUMMARY:** The Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) intends to prepare an

Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the impacts associated with the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired generation. TVA will use the EIS process to elicit and prioritize the values and concerns of stakeholders; formulate, evaluate and compare alternatives; provide opportunities for public review and comment; and ensure that TVA's evaluation of potential retirement and replacement energy generation reflects a full range of stakeholder input. Public comment is invited concerning the scope of the EIS, alternatives being considered, and environmental issues that should be addressed as a part of this EIS. TVA is also requesting data, information and analysis relevant to the proposed action from the public; affected Federal, State, tribal, and local governments, agencies, and offices; the scientific community; industry; or any other interested party.

**DATES:** To ensure consideration, comments on the scope and environmental issues must be postmarked, emailed or submitted online no later than June 10, 2021. To facilitate the scoping process, TVA will hold a public scoping meeting; see <http://www.tva.gov/nepa> for more information on the meeting.

**SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:** This notice is provided in accordance with the regulations promulgated by Council on Environmental Quality at 40 CFR parts 1500 to 1508 (84 FR 43304, July 16, 2020) and TVA's procedures implementing the National Environmental Policy Act at 18 CFR part 1318. TVA is an agency and instrumentality of the United States, established by an act of Congress in 1933, to foster the social and economic welfare of the people of the Tennessee Valley region and to promote the proper use and conservation of the region's natural resources. One component of this mission is the generation,

transmission, and sale of reliable and affordable electric energy.

### Background

In June 2019, TVA published the 2019 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP), which was developed with input from stakeholder groups and the general public. The 2019 IRP evaluated six scenarios (plausible futures) and five strategies (potential TVA responses to those futures) and identified a range of potential resource additions and retirements throughout the TVA power service area, which encompasses approximately 80,000 square miles covering most of Tennessee and parts of Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, and Virginia. The target supply mix adopted by the TVA Board through the 2019 IRP included the potential retirement of 2,200 MW of coal-fired generation by 2038. The IRP acknowledged continued operational challenges for the aging coal fleet and included a recommendation to conduct end-of-life evaluations during the term of the IRP to determine whether retirements greater than 2,200 MW would be appropriate.

Following the publication of the IRP, TVA began conducting these evaluations to inform long-term planning. TVA's recent evaluation confirms that the aging coal fleet is among the oldest in the nation and is experiencing deterioration of material condition and performance challenges. The performance challenges are projected to increase because of the coal fleet's advancing age and the difficulty of adapting the fleet's generation within the changing generation profile; and, in general, because the coal fleet is contributing to environmental, economic, and reliability risks.

CUF is located in Cumberland City, Stewart County, Tennessee, approximately 22 miles southwest of Clarksville. The plant is on a large reservation of approximately 2,388 acres located at the confluence of Wells Creek and the south bank of the Cumberland River. Built between 1968 and 1973, CUF is the largest plant in the TVA coal fleet. The two-unit, coal-fired steam-generating plant has a summer net capability of 2,470 megawatts (MW). CUF is 15 to 20 years younger than TVA's other coal plants, but frequent cycling of the large super-critical units, a recent change in the method of plant operation for which the plant was not originally designed, presents reliability challenges that are difficult to anticipate and very expensive to mitigate. Based on this analysis, TVA has developed planning assumptions for CUF retirement. TVA proposes to retire one

CUF unit as early as 2026 but no later than 2030, and the second unit as early as 2028 but no later than 2033, dependent on internal and external factors that could affect bringing replacement generation online.

The Cumberland EIS assesses the impact of retiring both CUF units and of replacing the generation of one of those units, as discussed in the Alternatives section below. To recover the generation capacity lost from retirement of one CUF unit, TVA is proposing the addition of approximately 1,450 MW of replacement generation. To maintain adequate reserves on the TVA system, this 1,450 MW replacement generation would need to be in commercial operation prior to retirement of the first CUF unit. Replacement generation for the second retired CUF unit would likely consist of some combination of gas, solar, and storage, but the planning for that generation can be deferred to allow more time to assess the specific types and locations of that generation. Additional tiered NEPA analysis will be completed as these future generation needs are identified.

### Alternatives

TVA anticipates that the scope of the EIS will include various alternatives in addition to the no action alternative (continuing to operate CUF). TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the EIS: (A) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the same site; (B) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations; (C) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations. Whether these or other alternatives are reasonable warranting further consideration under NEPA would be determined in the course of preparing the EIS. Connected actions, such as the natural gas pipeline and transmission upgrades, will also be considered in this assessment.

### Proposed Issues To Be Addressed

The EIS will address the effects of each alternative on the environment, including

- emissions of greenhouse gases,
- fuel consumption,
- air quality,
- water quality and quantity,
- waste generation and disposal,
- land use,
- ecological,
- cultural resources,
- transportation,
- visual and noise,

- socioeconomic impacts and environmental justice.

The EIS will include discussion and review of any proposed natural gas pipeline(s) that would be a necessary component of a new proposed CC or CT plants under Alternatives A or B. Currently under Alternative A, TVA is considering replacing generation at the CUF location which would require an approximate 30 mile natural gas pipeline to bring gas supply to the CUF reservation. Under Alternative B, since TVA is considering replacement generation at locations with existing transmission infrastructure and an adequate supply of natural gas, no further pipeline construction would be needed other than the lateral lines necessary to make the connection to the facility itself. The construction of the natural gas pipeline(s) would likely be subject to Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) jurisdiction and additional review will be undertaken by FERC in accordance with its own NEPA procedures. The proposed action may also require issuance of an Individual or Nationwide Permit under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act; Section 401 Water Quality Certification; conformance with Executive Orders on Environmental Justice (12898), Wetlands (11990), Floodplain Management (11988), Migratory Birds (13186), and Invasive Species (13112); and compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act, and other applicable Local, Federal and State regulations.

### Scoping Process

Scoping, which is integral to the process for implementing NEPA, provides an early and open process to ensure that (1) issues are identified early and properly studied; (2) issues of little significance do not consume substantial time and effort; (3) the draft EIS is thorough and balanced; and (4) delays caused by an inadequate EIS are avoided.

TVA invites members of the public as well as Federal, state, and local agencies and federally recognized Indian tribes to comment on the scope of the EIS. Information about this project is available on the TVA web page at [www.tva.com/nepa](http://www.tva.com/nepa), including a link to a virtual public meeting room and an online public comment page. Comments on the scope of this EIS should be submitted no later than the date given under the **DATES** section of this notice. Any comments received, including names and addresses, will become part of the administrative record and will be available for public inspection.

After consideration of the comments received during this scoping period, TVA will summarize public and agency comments, identify the issues and alternatives to be addressed in the draft EIS, and identify the schedule for completing the EIS process. Following analysis of the issues, TVA will prepare a draft EIS for public review and comment. Notice of availability of the draft EIS will be published by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in the **Federal Register**. TVA will solicit written comments on the draft EIS and also hold a public open house, which may be virtual, for this purpose. TVA expects to release the draft EIS in Spring of 2022. TVA anticipates issuing the final EIS in Fall of 2022 and a record of decision at least 30 days after its release.

**SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:** The FAA is reviewing a request by the City of Evergreen Alabama to release approximately 1.76 acres, more or less of airport property at Evergreen Municipal Airport (GZH) under the provisions of Title 49, U.S.C. Section 47107(h)(2). The sale of the subject property will result in the land at GZH being released from the conditions of the Airport Improvement Program Grant Agreement Grant Assurances. The FAA determined that the request to release property at GZH submitted by the Sponsor meets the procedural requirements of the Federal Aviation Administration and the release of the property does not and will not impact future aviation needs at the airport. The FAA may approve the request, in whole or in part, no sooner than thirty days after the publication of this notice. The 1.76 acres of property is located within the runway protection zone and the FAA has concurred that the sponsor has done a sufficient level of analysis per guidance on land use in the runway protection zone. A deed restriction or easement for obstruction clearing will remain on the 1.76 acres. In accordance with 49 U.S.C. 47107(c)(2)(B)(i) and (iii), the airport will receive fair market value for the property, which will be subsequently reinvested in another eligible airport improvement project at GZH.



TVA preliminarily planned to consider three action alternatives in the EIS: (A) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the same site; (B) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations; (C) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations. However, the alternatives considered in the EIS may increase, decrease, evolve or change based on scoping comments received and initial analysis.

Whether these or other alternatives are reasonable warranting further consideration under NEPA would be determined in the course of preparing the EIS. Connected actions, such as the natural gas pipeline and transmission upgrades, will also be considered in this assessment.

### Environmental Impact Statement for Cumberland Fossil Plant Retirement

**AGENCY:** Tennessee Valley Authority.

**ACTION:** Notice of intent.

**SUMMARY:** The Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) intends to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the impacts associated with the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired generation. TVA will use the EIS process to elicit and prioritize the values and concerns of stakeholders; formulate, evaluate and compare alternatives; provide opportunities for public review and comment; and ensure that TVA's evaluation of potential retirement and replacement energy generation reflects a full range of stakeholder input. Public comment is invited concerning the scope of the EIS, alternatives being considered, and environmental issues that should be addressed as a part of this EIS. TVA is also requesting data, information and analysis relevant to the proposed action from the public; affected Federal, State, tribal, and local governments, agencies, and offices; the scientific community; industry; or any other interested party.

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**SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:**

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**Background**

In June 2019, TVA published the 2019 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP), which was developed with input from stakeholder groups and the general public. The 2019 IRP evaluated six scenarios (plausible futures) and five strategies (potential TVA responses to those futures) and identified a range of potential resource additions and retirements throughout the TVA power service area, which encompasses approximately 80,000 square miles covering most of Tennessee and parts of Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, and Virginia. The target supply mix adopted by the TVA Board through the 2019 IRP included the potential retirement of 2,200 MW of coal-fired generation by 2038. The IRP acknowledged continued operational challenges for the aging coal fleet and included a recommendation to conduct end-of-life evaluations during the term of the IRP to determine whether retirements greater than 2,200 MW would be appropriate.



Following the publication of the IRP, TVA began conducting these evaluations to inform long-term planning. TVA's recent evaluation confirms that the aging coal fleet is among the oldest in the nation and is experiencing deterioration of material condition and performance challenges. The performance challenges are projected to increase because of the coal fleet's advancing age and the difficulty of adapting the fleet's generation within the changing generation profile; and, in general, because the coal fleet is contributing to environmental, economic, and reliability risks.

CUF is located in Cumberland City, Stewart County, Tennessee, approximately 22 miles southwest of Clarksville. The plant is on a large reservation of approximately 2,388 acres located at the confluence of Wells Creek and the south bank of the Cumberland River. Built between 1968 and 1973, CUF is the largest plant in the TVA coal fleet. The two-unit, coal-fired steam-generating plant has a summer net capability of 2,470 megawatts (MW). CUF is 15 to 20 years younger than TVA's other coal plants, but frequent cycling of the large super-critical units, a recent change in the method of plant operation for which the plant was not originally designed, presents reliability challenges that are difficult to anticipate and very expensive to mitigate. Based on this analysis, TVA has developed planning assumptions for CUF retirement. TVA proposes to retire one CUF unit as early as 2026 but no later than 2030, and the second unit as early as 2028 but no later than 2033, dependent on internal and external factors that could affect bringing replacement generation online.

The Cumberland EIS assesses the impact of retiring both CUF units and of replacing the generation of one of those units, as discussed in the Alternatives section below. To recover the generation capacity lost from retirement of one CUF unit, TVA is proposing the addition of approximately 1,450 MW of replacement generation. To maintain adequate reserves on the TVA system, this 1,450 MW replacement generation would need to be in commercial operation prior to retirement of the first CUF unit. Replacement generation for

the second retired CUF unit would likely consist of some combination of gas, solar, and storage, but the planning for that generation can be deferred to allow more time to assess the specific types and locations of that generation. Additional tiered NEPA analysis will be completed as these future generation needs are identified.

### **Alternatives**

TVA anticipates that the scope of the EIS will include various alternatives in addition to the no action alternative (continuing to operate CUF). TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the EIS: (A) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the same site; (B) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations; (C) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations. Whether these or other alternatives are reasonable warranting further consideration under NEPA would be determined in the course of preparing the EIS. Connected actions, such as the natural gas pipeline and transmission upgrades, will also be considered in this assessment.

### **Proposed Issues To Be Addressed**

The EIS will address the effects of each alternative on the environment, including

- emissions of greenhouse gases,
- fuel consumption,
- air quality,
- water quality and quantity,
- waste generation and disposal,
- land use,
- ecological,
- cultural resources,
- transportation,

- visual and noise,
- socioeconomic impacts and environmental justice.

The EIS will include discussion and review of any proposed natural gas pipeline(s) that would be a necessary component of a new proposed CC or CT plants under Alternatives A or B. Currently under Alternative A, TVA is considering replacing generation at the CUF location which would require an approximate 30 mile natural gas pipeline to bring gas supply to the CUF reservation. Under Alternative B, since TVA is considering replacement generation at locations with existing transmission infrastructure and an adequate supply of natural gas, no further pipeline construction would be needed other than the lateral lines necessary to make the connection to the facility itself. The construction of the natural gas pipeline(s) would likely be subject to Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) jurisdiction and additional review will be undertaken by FERC in accordance with its own NEPA procedures. The proposed action may also require issuance of an Individual or Nationwide Permit under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act; Section 401 Water Quality Certification; conformance with Executive Orders on Environmental Justice (12898), Wetlands (11990), Floodplain Management (11988), Migratory Birds (13186), and Invasive Species (13112); and compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act, and other applicable Local, Federal and State regulations.

### **Scoping Process**

Scoping, which is integral to the process for implementing NEPA, provides an early and open process to ensure that (1) issues are identified early and properly studied; (2) issues of little significance do not consume substantial time and effort; (3) the draft EIS is thorough and balanced; and (4) delays caused by an inadequate EIS are avoided.

TVA invites members of the public as well as Federal, state, and local agencies and federally recognized Indian tribes to comment on the scope of the EIS. Information about

this project is available on the TVA web page at [www.tva.com/nepa](http://www.tva.com/nepa), including a link to a virtual public meeting room and an online public comment page. Comments on the scope of this EIS should be submitted no later than the date given under the **DATES** section of this notice. Any comments received, including names and addresses, will become part of the administrative record and will be available for public inspection.

After consideration of the comments received during this scoping period, TVA will summarize public and agency comments, identify the issues and alternatives to be addressed in the draft EIS, and identify the schedule for completing the EIS process.

Following analysis of the issues, TVA will prepare a draft EIS for public review and comment. Notice of availability of the draft EIS will be published by the U.S.

Environmental Protection Agency in the Federal Register. TVA will solicit written comments on the draft EIS and also hold a public open house, which may be virtual, for this purpose. TVA expects to release the draft EIS in Spring of 2022. TVA anticipates issuing the final EIS in Fall of 2022 and a record of decision at least 30 days after its release.

Southern Environmental Law Center, Appalachian Voices, Energy Alabama, Sierra Club, and Southern Alliance for Clean Energy submit these comments on TVA's notice of intent to prepare an EIS to assess the impacts of retiring and replacing the coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant.<sup>1</sup>

As a federal agency, the largest public utility in the nation, and a major source of greenhouse gas emissions, TVA is well positioned to lead the national response to the climate crisis. President Biden has made achieving "a carbon pollution-free electricity sector no later than 2035" an urgent national priority and has ordered all federal agencies "to *immediately* commence work to confront the climate crisis."<sup>2</sup> The Cumberland Fossil Plant is one of the largest and dirtiest coal-fired power plants in the country, responsible for millions of tons of greenhouse gas emissions annually. TVA must retire it.

But TVA must not replace these retired coal units with gas-fired generation and make yet another multi-decade commitment to a carbon-polluting fossil fuel. If it did, TVA—a federal agency—would derail the president’s climate objectives and contribute to the climate-related harm already affecting public health, biodiversity, and economic productivity across the Southeast. Therefore, we urge the utility to use the proposed environmental analysis to:

- Evaluate existing carbon-free distributed and utility-scale technologies, *alone and in combination*, as alternatives to the Cumberland Plant. These technologies include demand response, energy efficiency, distributed solar, utility-scale solar, onshore wind, and battery storage; and
- Evaluate the environmental impacts of all alternatives by: (a) quantifying greenhouse gas emissions and assessing climate harm using the Social Cost of Carbon, (b) using appropriate tools to fairly identify environmental justice populations and assessing the disproportionate harm to specific communities, and (c) considering all site-specific impacts.

Congress has instructed TVA to be a “national leader in technological innovation, low-cost power, and environmental stewardship.”<sup>3</sup> TVA must seize this moment.

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## COMMENTS

### I. INTRODUCTION

The climate crisis is causing immediate, devastating harms to public health, biodiversity, and economic productivity.<sup>1</sup> In order to stave off the worst effects of climate change, greenhouse gas emissions must reach zero as quickly as possible. Communities in the Tennessee Valley and the Southeast are especially vulnerable to climate change,<sup>2</sup> and low-wealth individuals and Black, indigenous, and other people of color will disproportionately be harmed.<sup>3</sup>

In January, faced with the realities of the climate crisis, President Biden ordered the entire federal government to take decisive, bold action—including swiftly decarbonizing the electricity sector. In Executive Order 14008, *Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad*, President Biden establishes the goals of “net-zero emissions, economy-wide, by no later than 2050” and “a carbon pollution-free electricity sector no later than 2035.”<sup>4</sup> The president emphasized the urgency of the moment: “The United States and the world face a profound climate crisis. We have a narrow moment to pursue action at home and abroad in order to avoid the most catastrophic impacts of that crisis and to seize the opportunity that tackling climate change presents.”<sup>5</sup> The Executive Order calls for a “government-wide approach,” as

the “Federal Government must drive assessment, disclosure, and mitigation of climate pollution and climate-related risks in every sector of our economy, marshaling the creativity, courage, and capital necessary to make our Nation resilient in the face of this threat.”<sup>6</sup>

The Tennessee Valley Authority is a federal agency, the largest public utility in the nation, and a major source of greenhouse gas emissions. TVA is now considering whether to retire the Cumberland Fossil Plant, in Cumberland City, Tennessee—the largest coal-fired power plant in TVA’s fleet and one of the dirtiest coal plants operating anywhere in the United States.<sup>7</sup> To meet the goals of Executive Order 14008, TVA *must* close this facility. Doing so will cut dangerous CO<sub>2</sub> emissions and end nearly five decades of toxic mercury and selenium pollution dumped into the Cumberland River. These are urgent priorities, and the utility should pursue them apace.

But TVA will fail to take the bold, decisive action required by the president if it replaces the Cumberland Plant with new gas-fired generation. New gas plants are not minor additions that TVA can easily walk away from whenever it pleases. They represent major investments—often lasting more than forty years—that will generate avoidable and dangerous greenhouse gas emissions for decades to come.<sup>8</sup> Unchecked, TVA—a federal agency—would derail President Biden’s climate objectives.

TVA’s decision to prepare an environmental analysis for the retirement of the Cumberland Plant (the Cumberland EIS) comes at a critical moment

when substantial reductions in greenhouse gas emissions are both necessary and feasible. The utility must seize this opportunity to carefully and thoroughly consider the climate crisis in every aspect of the Cumberland EIS. Specifically, TVA must:

- Evaluate existing carbon-free distributed and utility-scale technologies, *alone and in combination*, as alternatives to the Cumberland Plant. These technologies include demand response, energy efficiency, distributed solar, utility-scale solar, onshore wind, and battery storage.
- Evaluate the environmental impacts of all alternatives by: (a) quantifying greenhouse gas emissions and assessing climate harm using the Social Cost of Carbon, (b) using appropriate tools to fairly identify environmental justice populations and assessing the disproportionate harm to specific communities, and (c) considering all site-specific impacts.

TVA should replace the Cumberland Plant with carbon-free alternatives to align with President Biden’s 2035 decarbonization mandate and to do its part to address the climate crisis, achieve environmental justice, and fulfill its statutory mission to be “a national leader in technological innovation, low-cost power, and environmental stewardship.”<sup>9</sup> The proposed Cumberland EIS offers TVA an opportunity to show the nation that it has the zeal, foresight, and ability to lead the nation’s energy transition at this critical moment.

## **II. TVA MUST RETIRE THE CUMBERLAND PLANT, ONE OF THE DIRTIEST COAL-FIRED POWER PLANTS IN THE UNITED STATES.**

TVA must retire the Cumberland Plant, one of the dirtiest coal-fired power plants in the United States. Operational since 1973, the Cumberland Plant in Cumberland City, Tennessee, is the largest coal-fired power plant in

TVA's fleet and one of the largest in the nation.<sup>10</sup> The plant burns millions of tons of coal annually and is one of the nation's largest standalone sources of greenhouse gas emissions. In 2014, it released over 13 million metric tons of greenhouse gases, ranking it 14th among large greenhouse-gas emitters tracked by EPA.<sup>11</sup>

The Cumberland Plant is also one of the country's largest sources of toxic mercury and selenium pollution. The plant generates approximately one million tons of coal combustion residuals (coal ash) waste annually<sup>12</sup> and, in 2016, produced an average of 2,097 million gallons of wastewater each day.<sup>13</sup> A report published by the Environmental Integrity Project identified the facility as the worst mercury polluter and second-worst selenium polluter *among all coal plants nationwide*.<sup>14</sup> The report, based on information provided by TVA to EPA and available to the public in the Toxics Release Inventory, found that in 2015, TVA dumped 120 pounds of mercury and 6,000 pounds of selenium from the Cumberland Plant into the Cumberland River.<sup>15</sup>

Although TVA's subsequent Toxic Release Inventory reporting indicates a reduction in these discharges, TVA continued to dump 61 pounds of mercury into the river in 2019.<sup>16</sup> In 2016, the utility discharged 1,300 pounds of selenium into the river.<sup>17</sup> These polluted discharges flow downstream into from cherished and protected recreational and wildlife areas in Tennessee, including Barkley Wildlife Management Area, Cross Creeks National Wildlife Refuge, and Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area. Several drinking water intakes are also located downstream from the Cumberland Plant.

In the 2020 *Steam Electric Reconsideration Rule*, TVA sought and obtained an exemption from federal toxic wastewater standards—standards that apply to all coal plants—specifically for the Cumberland Plant.<sup>18</sup> This exemption allows the utility to avoid installing modern pollution controls and continue polluting the Cumberland River with large quantities of mercury and selenium as long as it operates.<sup>19</sup>

It is time for TVA to put an end to pollution from the Cumberland Plant, but it must ensure that it does not replace one dirty fossil fuel with another.

### **III. TVA MUST EVALUATE A FULL RANGE OF CARBON-FREE ALTERNATIVES TO THE CUMBERLAND PLANT.**

#### **A. NEPA and a presidential mandate require TVA to evaluate carbon-free alternatives.**

To comply with the National Environmental Policy Act and President Biden’s Executive Orders concerning the climate crisis, the Cumberland EIS must evaluate a full range of carbon-free alternatives. TVA’s proposed set of three alternatives—two that would require new gas plants and only one based on carbon-free energy<sup>20</sup>—is far too restricted to satisfy the agency’s legal requirements and meet the urgency of the climate crisis head-on.

The evaluation of all reasonable alternatives is a bedrock requirement of NEPA. The statute requires that every EIS include a “detailed statement” on “alternatives to the proposed action.”<sup>21</sup> The Council on Environmental Quality’s NEPA implementing regulations explain further that agencies must “[e]valuate reasonable alternatives to the proposed action” and [d]iscuss each alternative considered in detail.”<sup>22</sup> Moreover, federal agencies must “study, develop, and describe appropriate alternatives” for “any proposal which involves unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources.”<sup>23</sup> Few environmental conflicts are more immediate than the conflict between new gas-fired power plants and the urgent need to end all greenhouse gas emissions to combat the climate crisis.

President Biden’s Executive Orders make clear that carbon-free alternatives are both “reasonable” and “appropriate” for the Cumberland EIS.

Executive Order 13990 directs all executive departments and agencies “to *immediately* commence work to confront the climate crisis,”<sup>24</sup> and Executive Order 14008 makes achieving “a carbon pollution-free electricity sector no later than 2035” a national priority.<sup>25</sup> The president has deployed TVA and all other federal agencies as part of a “Government-wide approach that reduces climate pollution in every sector of the economy . . . and spurs well-paying union jobs and economic growth, *especially through innovation, commercialization, and deployment of clean energy technologies and infrastructure.*”<sup>26</sup> In short, TVA must do its part to achieve dramatic reductions in greenhouse gas emissions.

Finally, a robust analysis of carbon-free alternatives is also consistent with TVA’s 2019 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP). The 2019 IRP emphasizes that the utility must have flexibility: it does not select a preferred scenario for energy development, instead opting to recognize that “a variety of future scenarios are possible and each strategy has positive aspects.”<sup>27</sup> TVA selected *all* of the 2019 IRP results for its final recommendation “to provide flexibility for how the future evolves.”<sup>28</sup> In other words, the 2019 IRP deferred until later analysis at the individual project stage to gauge the pace, scope, and cost of changes to the energy landscape of the Tennessee Valley and to determine the best manner and resources to address them. In the absence of a comprehensive evaluation to optimize the retirement and replacement of all coal plants at once, like through an updated IRP, the Cumberland EIS is the right venue for TVA to undertake the analysis of carbon-free alternatives.

**B. TVA must evaluate an alternative which retires, but does not replace, the Cumberland Fossil Plant.**

One factor identified in the 2019 IRP—changes in the “demand for electricity”<sup>29</sup>—raises significant questions about the need to replace the generating capacity of the Cumberland Plant. In its Notice, TVA assumes that it will need to replace 1450 MW of generating capacity for the first Cumberland coal unit.<sup>30</sup> But it is far from clear that TVA must replace this retiring capacity *at all*, let alone with another 1450 MW of combined-cycle or combustion-turbine gas generation that will pollute for decades into the future. Indeed, during the recent extreme weather event in February 2021, TVA touted the fact that it was not only able to meet its own three-year high of demand, but was also able to send excess electricity outside of the region to assist neighboring utilities who were suffering grid outages.<sup>31</sup> TVA also maintains a large reserve margin, one that is substantially larger than that recommended by the North American Electric Reliability Corporation to maintain reliability,<sup>32</sup> and expects demand “to be flat, or even declining slightly, over the next 10 years.”<sup>33</sup>

In addition, demand for TVA power may decline further because several customers may terminate their power supply contracts with the utility. These customers include four local utilities that filed a petition with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for unbundled access to TVA's transmission grid.<sup>34</sup> These four utilities represent roughly three to four percent of TVA's overall load. TVA's largest customer, Memphis Light, Gas & Water, representing another 10 percent of TVA's load, is actively considering other power supply options.<sup>35</sup> TVA is of course well aware that it may serve fewer distribution utility customers in the future and accordingly may have significantly lower demand. Indeed, TVA has been so concerned about the defection of its distribution utility customers and the corresponding load loss that, in 2019, it made a significant change in its power supply contracts in an attempt to permanently lock in as much of its load as possible.<sup>36</sup>

Yet another development potentially affecting demand that TVA must evaluate is the proposed Southeast Energy Exchange Market (SEEM), currently under consideration at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.<sup>37</sup> The SEEM was not part of TVA's 2019 IRP. The Cumberland EIS must analyze whether SEEM could provide an alternative to building new generation to replace Cumberland Plant retirements.

These developments, and their implication that TVA has and may continue to have excess generating capacity, are specifically the types of changes in the energy landscape that TVA pledged to evaluate in its 2019 IRP.<sup>38</sup> They raise serious questions about whether there is even a need to replace 1450 MW of coal generation at the Cumberland Plant. TVA must address an alternative that retires, but does not replace, the Cumberland Plant in the Cumberland EIS.

**C. TVA must evaluate the use of carbon-free technologies, *alone and in combination*, as alternatives to the Cumberland Plant.**

TVA must expand its proposed alternatives analysis beyond a single carbon-free option to include all carbon-free technologies *alone and in combination*. First, TVA cannot lawfully ignore energy efficiency and demand response technologies in its analysis. The TVA Act requires the utility to consider energy efficiency and “to treat demand and supply resources on a consistent and integrated basis.”<sup>39</sup> TVA knows how cost-effective these resources are. In its own sensitivity analysis in the 2019 IRP, when artificial caps are removed, the planning model picks energy efficiency and demand response instead of new gas generation.<sup>40</sup> Specifically, the sensitivity analysis revealed that 1900 MW of energy efficiency and demand response displaces the need for new gas-fired combustion turbines like the plants proposed in TVA’s Alternative B.<sup>41</sup> The 2019 IRP also identifies demand response as a technology with the potential to provide the same reliability and flexibility as gas plants generally.<sup>42</sup> Second, TVA must evaluate carbon-free technologies in reasonable combinations as replacements for the Cumberland Plant.

Specifically, in addition to proposed Alternative C, utility-scale solar and battery storage, the Cumberland EIS must include these alternatives:

- Distributed solar;
- Onshore wind;
- Demand response and energy efficiency;
- Solar (distributed and utility-scale), onshore wind, energy efficiency, demand response, and battery storage; and
- Purchased carbon-free power.

Lagging in each of these carbon-free resources,<sup>43</sup> TVA has tremendous room for growth. President Biden has ordered TVA to do its part to address the climate crisis, and the utility's alternatives analysis in the Cumberland EIS must reflect the urgency of the moment. In short, the Cumberland EIS should be dominated by the review of carbon-free options, and the methods and assumptions TVA uses to evaluate them, rather than the gas options proposed in TVA's Notice.

Further, TVA has committed to electrifying the transportation sector, with a goal to put 200,000 electric vehicles on the road by 2028,<sup>44</sup> and that figure is likely to expand exponentially from there. It is critical that TVA invest in low-cost, energy-saving resources like energy efficiency and demand response to make space for electric vehicles without increasing greenhouse gas emissions. Building gas-fired power generation would waste the carbon gains of electric transportation, trading one fossil fuel for another.

Finally, even if replacing the Cumberland Plant with carbon-free alternatives were inconsistent with the 2019 IRP—which it is not—the IRP is a broad planning document and “does not dictate a specific series of actions . . . at particular plants.”<sup>45</sup> The IRP “sets nothing in stone about the particular amount, or even the particular range” of a given generation source across TVA’s system, much less at specific facilities.<sup>46</sup> TVA must now evaluate a full range of carbon-free alternatives, alone or in combination, for meeting the purported capacity need created by the retirement of the Cumberland Plant.

**IV. TVA MUST FULLY ASSESS THE IMPACTS OF THE PROPOSED ACTION AND ALL ALTERNATIVES ON THE ENVIRONMENT.**

**A. TVA must quantify greenhouse gas emissions and disclose the climate impacts of new gas plants.**

Because “[t]he harms associated with climate change are serious and well recognized,”<sup>47</sup> carefully considering a project’s climate impacts is critical to any NEPA review—particularly when the project may involve combusting gas in power plants,<sup>48</sup> thereby emitting CO<sub>2</sub> and other greenhouse gases that drive climate change. In Alternatives A and B, TVA proposes to build new gas plants.<sup>49</sup> These plants will burn fossil fuels for decades, jeopardizing the dwindling opportunity to ward off the worst effects of climate change. The Cumberland EIS must provide an accurate quantification of the greenhouse gas emissions of any proposed gas plants using the Social Cost of Carbon and discuss their environmental effects.

**1. TVA must accurately quantify the greenhouse gas emissions of any proposed gas plants using the Social Cost of Carbon.**

There is no action that contributes more significantly to climate change than building major fossil-fuel infrastructure like a new gas-fired power plant. TVA must accurately quantify and consider the greenhouse gas emissions associated with any gas plants proposed to replace the Cumberland Plant. Associated emissions must account for burning gas and leaking

methane, whether onsite or upstream.<sup>50</sup> TVA should quantify those impacts using the Social Cost of Carbon. Developed in 2010 and updated in 2016, the Social Cost of Carbon is a scientifically derived metric to “provide a consistent approach for agencies to quantify [climate change] damage in dollars.”<sup>51</sup> The Social Cost of Carbon translates a one-ton increase in CO<sub>2</sub> emissions into changes in atmospheric greenhouse gas concentrations, consequent changes in temperature, and resulting economic damages.<sup>52</sup> Those harms include “changes in net agricultural productivity, human health, property damages from increased flood risk, and the value of ecosystem services.”<sup>53</sup> The current values, which adjust the 2016 values for inflation, estimate that every additional ton of CO<sub>2</sub> released from anywhere on Earth will cause an approximately \$51 in climate damages.<sup>54</sup> Not only will the Social Cost of Carbon convey the harms of new gas plants, but it allows TVA “to incorporate the social benefits of reducing carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) emissions”<sup>55</sup> for evaluating carbon-free alternatives.

Executive Order 13990 instructed federal agencies to use the Social Cost of Carbon,<sup>56</sup> which has been widely endorsed by economists and

scientists.<sup>57</sup> The Social Cost of Carbon is useful and appropriate here to meaningfully convey the impacts of building new gas plants—and thereby adding decades of greenhouse gas emissions—in comparison to carbon-free alternatives like energy efficiency, demand response, renewable energy, or battery storage.

## **2. TVA must disclose the climate impacts of building new gas plants to replace the Cumberland Plant.**

Under NEPA, TVA must “quantify *and consider*” a project’s downstream greenhouse gas emissions, or explain why it cannot.<sup>58</sup> “The key requirement of NEPA . . . is that the agency consider and disclose the *actual environmental effects* in a manner that . . . brings those effects to bear on decisions to take particular actions that significantly affect the environment.”<sup>59</sup> Therefore, in the context of greenhouse gas emissions, NEPA review must “include a discussion of the ‘significance’ of this indirect effect . . . as well as ‘the incremental impact of the action.’”<sup>60</sup>

For the Cumberland EIS, TVA should include a “qualitative summary discussion of the impacts of [greenhouse gas] emissions based on authoritative reports.”<sup>61</sup> Those effects include “more frequent and intense

heat waves, longer fire seasons and more severe wildfires, degraded air quality, more heavy downpours and flooding, increased drought, greater sea-level rise, more intense storms, harm to water resources, harm to agriculture, ocean acidification, and harm to wildlife and ecosystems.”<sup>62</sup>

These impacts are not theoretical, and burning fossil fuels is the problem, not the answer. Historically cold weather swept across the United States in February 2021,<sup>63</sup> devastating many Texans who were left without power due in large part to failing gas facilities.<sup>64</sup> The same historic weather deprived many TVA-area residents of clean, reliable water for days, as freezing temperatures wreaked havoc on the water infrastructure of Memphis Light, Gas & Water, TVA’s largest customer.<sup>65</sup> For TVA, the past three years have been the wettest years in 131 years of record keeping, and 2020 set the single-year record with rainfall 139 percent above normal.<sup>66</sup> These climate impacts should be top of mind for TVA, given its mission to manage the Tennessee River watershed and control flooding in the Valley. A robust discussion of actual and worsening climate effects like these is essential for NEPA review of TVA’s generation decisions.

Considering reasonable alternatives, disclosing their greenhouse gas emissions, and discussing their environmental impacts, including through

the Social Cost of Carbon, will ensure that TVA and the public have the information necessary to make a reasoned decision.

**B. TVA must use appropriate tools to fairly identify environmental justice populations and must assess the disproportionate harm to specific communities.**

People of color and low-wealth communities often bear a disproportionate burden of the pollution caused by power plants, compressor stations, and other industrial facilities.<sup>67</sup> Confronting this legacy is a priority of the federal government.<sup>68</sup> In January, President Biden declared that the federal government “must deliver environmental justice in communities all across America” and that federal agencies “shall make achieving environmental justice part of their missions.”<sup>69</sup> NEPA review is an important opportunity for agencies to implement these environmental justice goals, and it is critical that TVA do this analysis in the Cumberland EIS. In doing so, TVA must be mindful to use appropriate tools to fairly identify environmental justice populations and must assess the disproportionate harm to specific communities.

“The purpose of an environmental justice analysis is to determine whether a project will have a disproportionately adverse effect on minority

and low income populations.”<sup>70</sup> Broadly speaking, this requires two steps. First, an agency must correctly identify the environmental justice communities in the vicinity of the proposed action.<sup>71</sup> But it should be circumspect when relying solely on desktop demographic tools like EPA’s EJSCREEN and census data. The analysis provided by these tools can often be too coarse to detect the presence of environmental justice communities concentrated in a small area.<sup>72</sup> As EPA itself has cautioned, “[t]he fact that census data can only be disaggregated to certain prescribed levels (*e.g.*, census tracts, census blocks) suggests that pockets of minority or low-income communities, including those that may be experiencing disproportionately high and adverse effects, may be missed in a traditional census tract-based analysis.”<sup>73</sup> Outreach in potentially impacted areas to identify people of color and low-wealth communities is critical.<sup>74</sup> EPA recommends supplementing

census data with local demographic data and research,<sup>75</sup> and specifically notes that EPA staff does not use EJSCREEN “[a]s a means to identify or label an area as an ‘EJ community’” or “[a]s a basis for agency decision-making or making a determination regarding the existence or absence of EJ concerns.”<sup>76</sup>

Second, once the agency has identified environmental justice communities, it must assess the disproportionate impacts of the project on the people in those specific communities. In the air quality context, the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals held in *Friends of Buckingham v. State Air Pollution Control Board* that “blindly relying on ambient air standards is not a sufficiently searching analysis of air quality standards for an EJ community.”<sup>77</sup> The Fourth Circuit had good reason to dismiss the notion that mere compliance with NAAQS means there will be no disproportionate adverse health risks. Whether a facility would allow an area to comply with air quality standards is distinct from whether it would have a disproportionately high and adverse effect on environmental justice populations. Otherwise, consideration of disproportionate harm would be required only for facilities that would contribute to a violation of such air quality standards—and thus could not lawfully be built.<sup>78</sup> Instead, the agency must examine the impacts of the pollutants from the proposed facility with an analysis “tailored to [the] specific EJ community.”<sup>79</sup> Some air pollutants, like fine particulates, have harmful effects even when air quality standards

are not violated.<sup>80</sup> TVA violates NEPA when it falls back on compliance with Clean Air Act permits limits as its sole justification for a “not significant” finding.

TVA must heed these guidelines in conducting its environmental justice analysis for the Cumberland EIS.

**C. TVA must perform site-specific analyses for all proposed generation facilities.**

TVA must perform site-specific analyses to determine proposed generation facilities’ potential impacts on each community. Under Alternative B, TVA would construct combustion-turbine gas plants “at alternate locations.”<sup>81</sup> Under Alternative C, TVA would construct and operate solar and storage facilities “primarily at alternate locations.”<sup>82</sup> TVA’s scoping notice does not indicate where these “alternate locations” might be or how the agency will analyze impacts to those communities.

NEPA requires TVA to consider the full scope of site-specific impacts for its decision to build new generation. Agencies must “[d]iscuss each alternative considered in detail,” disclosing and analyzing the reasonably foreseeable effects of proposed actions.<sup>83</sup> To the extent the agency proposes to “tier” its analysis from a broader programmatic EIS to subsequent NEPA review that is narrower in scope, such tiering should not allow the agency to obscure the extent of site-specific environmental impacts or to artificially

narrow the alternatives available during site-specific analysis.<sup>84</sup> NEPA “emphasizes the importance of coherent and comprehensive up-front environmental analysis to ensure informed decision making to the end that ‘the agency will not act on incomplete information, only to regret its decision after it is too late to correct.’”<sup>85</sup>

To fully inform itself and the public before making its decision, TVA must consider the site-specific impacts of the proposed renewable and gas facilities, including any related infrastructure, such as transmission lines, compressor stations, and gas pipelines. It is impossible to meaningfully analyze local pollution and land use in the abstract, and TVA cannot analyze environmental justice impacts at all without considering the unique histories and burdens of real communities. NEPA’s “twin aims” require TVA to consider “every significant aspect of the environmental impact of a proposed action”<sup>86</sup> and to “inform the public” that it has fully considered those impacts during the decision-making process.<sup>87</sup> To comply with NEPA, TVA must disclose and consider site-specific impacts before selecting or ruling out an alternative in the Cumberland EIS.

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) Notice of Intent (NOI) to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the impacts associated with the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired generation. To recover the generation capacity lost from retirement of one CUF unit, TVA is proposing the addition of approximately 1,450 megawatts of replacement generation. According to TVA, replacement generation for the second retired CUF unit would likely consist of some combination of gas, solar, and storage, but the planning for that generation can be deferred to allow more time to assess the specific types and locations of that generation.

TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the EIS: (A) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine Gas Plant at the same site; (B) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine Gas Plants at alternate locations; (C) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations. Connected actions, such as the natural gas pipeline and transmission upgrades, will also be considered in this assessment. TDEC has reviewed the NOI and has the following comments:

**Cultural Resources**

Based on the information provided in the NOI, TDEC believes there is a potential for the project to adversely affect cultural resources. The construction of new facilities could disturb archaeological resources and any alternatives should be coordinated in consultation with TVA and the State Historic Preservation Office.<sup>1</sup>

## **Air Resources**

This proposed project may include demolition and renovation of structures. TDEC asbestos renovation and demolition regulations apply to any building or structure known to contain asbestos or to any buildings proposed to be demolished. When any structures are proposed to be renovated or demolished, an asbestos demolition notification must be provided in advance, and proper pre-demolition surveys need to be conducted to identify any regulated asbestos containing material (ACM) present. Prior to any demolition, all facilities must be examined for ACM and all potential ACM in the buildings proposed for demolition must be handled and disposed of according to the applicable federal, state, and local regulations. TDEC encourages TVA to include these considerations in the Draft EIS.

TDEC has responsibility for open burning regulations within the state of Tennessee, and must be contacted prior to conducting any open burning of vegetation, untreated wood, or wood waste generated from the project.<sup>2</sup> TDEC recommends that disposal methods other than open burning be considered and, if found to be practical, employed for disposal actions. Additionally, it is recommended that good smoke management practices be followed during any open burning activity. TDEC encourages TVA to include these considerations in the Draft EIS

Construction activities at the site will likely cause emissions of fugitive dust. TDEC provides specific requirements for prevention of fugitive dust, including use, where possible, of asphalt, water or suitable chemicals to limit its creation.<sup>3</sup> TDEC encourages TVA to include these considerations in the Draft EIS.

TDEC recommends that TVA consider the use of idle restrictions for heavy construction equipment and dump trucks in use and on site to minimize emissions from these activities. Additionally, TDEC recommends that all construction equipment employed on site be well maintained and equipped with the latest emissions control equipment to reduce air pollution associated with the project's activities and encourages TVA to consider these comments in the Draft EIS.

For any new air pollution sources that will be built as a result of this project, TDEC requires that an application for a construction permit be made not less than 90 days prior to the estimated start date of construction for minor new source review and not less than 120 days prior to the estimated start date of construction for new source review. TDEC encourages TVA to include these considerations in the Draft EIS.

## **Water Resources**

Alternative A would require a 30-mile natural gas pipeline to be constructed. Several streams would be crossed and an Aquatic Resource Alteration Permit (ARAP) would be required. With the magnitude of the construction and the water resources involved, a hydrologic determination by a qualified hydrologic professional will be necessary to fully determine potential impacts to streams and wetlands. The project

will disturb more than an acre of land and require a construction stormwater permit (CGP). TDEC encourages TVA to include these considerations in the Draft EIS.

It is expected that Alternative B would require a CGP and possibly ARAP; however, more information is needed. There is also minimal information provided for Alternative C in the NOI, but a CGP would be expected and potentially ARAP permit(s) depending on the locations selected, and possibly a hydrologic determination. TDEC encourages TVA to include these considerations in the Draft EIS.

TDEC appreciates the opportunity to comment on this NOI to prepare an EIS. Please note that these comments are not indicative of approval or disapproval of the proposed action or its alternatives, nor should they be interpreted as an indication regarding future permitting decisions by TDEC. On behalf of the Center for Biological Diversity (“Center”), we submit these scoping comments on the Tennessee Valley Authority’s (“TVA”) Notice of Intent to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (“EIS”) for the retirement of the Cumberland Fossil Plant (“Cumberland Plant”). We appreciate the opportunity to provide these comments on issues including the necessity for TVA to add a critical action alternative to the EIS: offsetting the Cumberland Plant’s electricity production with distributed energy resources (“DER”), storage, and energy efficiency improvements. Moreover, the climate emergency and growing energy inequity in the Tennessee Valley demand an expedited phasing out of fossil fuels. The EIS must therefore also fully consider retiring both Cumberland units much sooner than the proposed 2033 timeline.

We applaud TVA’s decision to retire the Cumberland Plant and encourage TVA to rapidly pursue retiring its other remaining coal plants. However, at present TVA only intends to consider three action alternatives for the Cumberland Plant’s retirement, only one of which would replace the coal plant with renewable energy. The other two alternatives prioritize Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (“CC”) gas plants and Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (“CT”) gas plants. Both of these energy options fail to address the most pressing issue today: the urgent need for a rapid transition away from all fossil fuels toward a renewable energy economy in order to avoid the worst impacts of climate change and address the disproportionate harm experienced by environmental justice communities from the fossil fuel economy. Given the most recent climate change science and the significant climate change harms already occurring in TVA’s territory,

TVA must consider alternatives that would have the agency do its requisite part to advance this necessary energy transition.

Moreover, earlier this year President Biden issued an Executive Order to transform the entire U.S. electricity sector to be carbon-free by 2035.<sup>1</sup> He emphasized the Administration’s policy “to organize and deploy the *full capacity of its agencies* to combat the climate crisis.”<sup>2</sup> As a federal agency and the country’s largest public power provider, TVA must advance carbon-free electricity on a timeline consistent with climate science and the President’s goal. The Cumberland Plant EIS must therefore fully and fairly consider alternatives providing for the rapid retirement of the Plant and its replacement with clean, renewable energy sources, including DER, storage and energy efficiency options, in order to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (“NEPA”), 42 U.S.C. § 4321, *et seq.*

## DISCUSSION

### A. The Climate Emergency Demands Immediate And Substantial Reductions in Greenhouse Gas Emissions From TVA.

#### 1. *The climate crisis on a global scale*

The U.S. federal government, and scientists globally, have determined that human-caused climate change is bringing wide-spread harms throughout the country and the world. As the U.S. government summarized in its most recent authoritative Report on the subject (the Fourth National Climate Assessment (“NCA”)), “evidence of human-caused climate change is overwhelming and continues to strengthen, [ ] the impacts of climate change are intensifying across the country, and [ ] climate-related threats to Americans’ physical, social, and economic well-being are rising.”<sup>3</sup>

This next decade is absolutely crucial to avoiding the most devastating impacts. The NCA makes clear that the harms of climate change are long-lived, and for that reason the steps taken *now* to combat – or to not combat – greenhouse gas (“GHG”) pollution will have implications for many decades to come.<sup>4</sup> Indeed, as detailed by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), without prompt action across all sectors, the world is headed to 2°C or more of warming in the coming decades, which will lead to catastrophic climate change impacts.<sup>5</sup>

The Fourth NCA also finds – with very high confidence – that the *status quo* threatens to bring the planet past tipping points that cannot be cured, and which threaten even more catastrophic impacts.<sup>6</sup> The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (“IPCC”) issued a very similar warning in 2014,<sup>7</sup> and the evidence that the climate system is approaching these tipping points only further demonstrates the urgent need for immediate action to address these threats.<sup>8</sup>

## 2. *The climate crisis in TVA’s territory*

Volume II of the Fourth National Climate Assessment, *Impacts, Risks, and Adaptation in the United States*, details the impacts of the climate crisis on the Tennessee Valley as a result of increased hurricanes, extended wildfire seasons, and myriad other impacts.<sup>9</sup> The Assessment explains how lower-income and marginalized communities will experience even greater impacts to their health, safety, and quality of life than others.<sup>10</sup>

In particular, the southeastern United States, a part of which is TVA's territory, has been facing and will continue to face extraordinary harms from climate change.<sup>11</sup> As the Environmental Protection Agency has detailed, climate change in the Southeast has already led to: (1) higher temperatures and greater demand for water that will strain water resources in the Southeast; (2) higher incidences of extreme weather, increased temperatures, and flooding that will likely impact human health, infrastructure, and agriculture; (3) sea level rise that is expected to contribute to increased hurricane activity and storm surge, and will increase the salinity of estuaries, coastal wetlands, tidal rivers, and swamps; and (4) coastal communities' experiencing of warmer temperatures and the impacts of sea level rise, including seawater flooding.<sup>12</sup> In other words, the impacts of climate change on TVA's territory and the communities that the agency serves are concrete, palpable, and are projected to be exacerbated—and will certainly do so should TVA fail to consider and pursue alternatives that rapidly reduce fossil fuel consumption.

**3. *TVA must rapidly reduce its GHG emissions to address the climate emergency.***

In light of the climate crisis, the IPCC has emphasized the urgent need for “rapid and far-reaching transitions” across all sectors including electricity generation.<sup>13</sup> Indeed, a critical feature of 1.5°C-consistent pathways is that the power sector must be significantly clean by 2030 and

achieve a “virtually full decarbonisation” around mid-century.<sup>14</sup> For electricity in particular, the share of renewable energy must reach 60% by 2030 and 77% by 2050.<sup>15</sup>

The U.S. is the world’s largest historic emitter of greenhouse gas pollution and is currently the world’s second highest emitter on an annual and per capita basis.<sup>16</sup> Scientific studies have estimated the remaining U.S. carbon budget consistent with the 1.5°C Paris Agreement target is approximately 25 gigatons of CO<sub>2</sub> equivalent (GtCO<sub>2</sub>eq)<sup>17</sup> to 57 GtCO<sub>2</sub>eq on average,<sup>18</sup> depending on the equity principles used to apportion the global budget across countries.<sup>19</sup> As the U.S. emits more than 6 GtCO<sub>2</sub>eq each year<sup>20</sup>, the remaining U.S. carbon budget compatible with the Paris

climate targets is extremely small and is rapidly being expended, highlighting the urgent need for the U.S. to transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy.

The electricity sector, in tandem with the transportation sector, is the leading source of U.S. GHG emissions, making up 25% of total emissions in 2019.<sup>21</sup> TVA emitted 49.53 million short tons of CO<sub>2</sub> emissions and 23.49 thousand short tons of NO<sub>x</sub> pollution in 2018 alone.<sup>22</sup>

Under its current Integrated Resource Plan (“IRP”), TVA will not achieve decarbonization until sometime after 2100.<sup>23</sup> This timeline is completely unacceptable and will only further harm communities of color and other frontline communities who have been disproportionately burdened by a reliance on fossil fuels and false energy solutions like fracked gas.

Indeed, like coal, fossil gas disproportionately harms low-income communities and people of color.<sup>24</sup> In addition to driving the climate crisis via especially potent methane emissions, gas generation produces over 60 hazardous air pollutants – including volatile organic compounds, carcinogens, and endocrine disrupting chemicals.<sup>25</sup> And gas generation exposes communities within closer proximity to gas facilities to elevated ozone levels which, among other harms, can exacerbate asthma and other diseases.<sup>26</sup>

Last month, TVA proposed a non-binding plan to decarbonize TVA by 2050.<sup>27</sup> Even this objective is woefully inadequate, but at bare minimum it makes no sense to build *new* fossil fuel

resources in the middle of the climate emergency. Accordingly, to address the climate crisis it is absolutely critical that TVA rapidly transition from fossil fuels, including both its remaining coal plants as well as its fossil gas resources, and that the agency not build any *new* fossil energy generation to replace the retirements of existing fossil resources.

**B. TVA’s Existing Alternatives For The Cumberland Plant Retirement Fail To Achieve The Rapid Greenhouse Gas Reductions That Are Critical To Addressing The Climate Crisis, And The EIS Must Fully Address The GHG Impacts Of All Reasonable Alternatives.**

Given the climate crisis and the important role TVA plays as the nation’s largest power provider, with massive GHG emissions, the Cumberland EIS must center the replacement of the Cumberland Plant with non-fossil fuel resources, including renewable energy and energy efficiency. At the moment, two of the three project alternatives consider CC and CT gas plants that would contribute to, instead of reduce, TVA’s already alarming GHG emissions through 2038. With increased reliance on gas as a replacement for coal, TVA *would still generate more than 34 million tons of CO<sub>2</sub> each year in 2038.*<sup>28</sup> This current emphasis on further gas expansion is simply unacceptable from the standpoint of what climate science demands.

In addition, while TVA currently intends to consider one alternative prioritizing solar and storage facilities, the EIS must also consider at least one additional project alternative that would maximize development of DER and storage and energy efficiency to provide the electricity lost from closing the Cumberland Plant.

**1. TVA must consider renewable energy alternatives aligned with a “path to zero emissions.”**

The purpose of NEPA is to identify reasonable alternatives to an agency’s proposed action, and then expose and discuss the multitude of public health, environmental, socio-economic, wildlife, and other impacts of those alternatives. However, regardless of the ultimate decisions made, NEPA does not permit an agency to refuse to even *consider* reasonable alternatives.<sup>29</sup> Accordingly, here TVA may not rely on contract terms or simple economic considerations to refuse to consider alternative scenarios for its power mix in the coming decades, including DER and storage alternatives.

This is particularly true given that TVA acknowledges that its statutory mandate under the TVA Act requires that it be a “leader in technology innovation, low-cost power and environmental stewardship.”<sup>30</sup> TVA therefore should be looking for opportunities to invest in the renewable energy technologies that will help reduce electricity prices and make those technologies even more cost-competitive in the coming years.

Recent research demonstrates that replacing fossil fuel resources with DER, storage, and energy efficiency could provide significant financial benefits. One analysis in particular modeled the cost-effectiveness and impact of DERs and other clean energy resources on the electricity system. Under the examined scenarios, significant investment in DER would result in cumulative system-wide savings of \$301 billion by 2050 compared to a business-as-usual energy system.<sup>31</sup> The same study showed that a clean electricity standard reducing emissions by 95 percent from 1990 levels by mid-century could save \$473 billion.<sup>32</sup>

In addition to cost savings, DERs bring several additional benefits including grid management, demand response, and transmission benefits.<sup>33</sup> TVA has expressed concern that alternatives prioritizing renewables like solar as replacements to Cumberland are incapable of addressing peak demand. But as the Vibrant Clean Energy report demonstrates, DER can actually minimize peak demand by about 17 percent and also effectively shift demand to meet variable supply rather than forcing supply to meet demand.<sup>34</sup>

Additionally, distributed solar generation can provide benefits to communities and ecosystems including reduced water use, reduced land use, and even improved wildlife habitat, which are critically important to TVA’s customers.<sup>35</sup>

Thus, TVA must consider a full range of renewable energy alternatives, including an alternative that largely or completely relies on DER, storage and energy efficiency, and then must

compare the environmental impacts of such alternatives with the other options—including not only the cost of potential early retirement of fossil fuel resources and expansion of gas, but also the social cost of carbon associated with keeping them running for many years to come.

In short, to meet its purpose of providing safe, clean, reliable, and affordable electricity to all its customers, TVA must consider alternatives that focus on DER, storage, and energy efficiency as replacements for the Cumberland Plant. Moreover, TVA must also consider an alternative that includes advancing the timeline for Cumberland’s complete retirement to earlier than 2033, which would significantly reduce TVA’s GHG emissions.

Instead of investing in risky alternatives, TVA should lead the way in investing in climate-friendly and just energy solutions, like distributed solar generation. Renewable energy and energy efficiency alternatives are proven technologies that not only make financial sense, and can lower power bills for TVA customers, but will advance TVA’s path to decarbonization.

**2. *TVA must meaningfully assess the impacts of greenhouse gas emissions by comparing impacts between the existing alternatives and one or more alternatives that chart a path to zero emissions.***

In other environmental reviews, TVA has refused to meaningfully consider its contributions to GHG emissions on the grounds that they are small relative to global emissions.<sup>36</sup> This approach violates NEPA.

It is well-established that NEPA requires a robust consideration of the impacts of a project’s GHG emissions in terms of its relationship to climate change. Thus, although some “speculation is . . . implicit in NEPA,” agencies may not “shirk their responsibilities under NEPA by labeling any and all discussion of future environmental effects as crystal ball inquiry.”<sup>37</sup>

Thus, TVA must add the necessary alternative(s) discussed above that will advance its rapid transition to zero emissions, all the while considering—and informing the public about—the likely environmental outcomes under the different alternatives. In particular, under two of the currently considered alternatives, which propose gas replacements, TVA will continue to be one of the largest contributors to the GHG that are fueling climate change, and thus will continue to be responsible for the devastating impacts that are certain to come in the country and around the world as we continue to increase the concentrations of GHGs in the atmosphere.

Alternatively, under a renewable energy alternative that maximizes DER, storage, and energy efficiency, as well as an expedited retirement timeline, TVA would not only commit its requisite part in phasing out fossil fuels and lowering GHG emissions, but also in addressing environmental justice concerns associated with a reliance on false solutions like fossil gas.

\* \* \*

The urgency of the climate and energy crises demand that large utilities, especially TVA, step up and meet the moment. It is now on power providers to not only rapidly phase out their fossil fuel fleets but to replace that energy with genuinely renewable sources. With the Cumberland Plant retirement, TVA has an opportunity to be a model this country needs for what a just and truly renewable energy transition should look like. TVA can and should lay the groundwork for the very technological solutions that other utilities can deploy to meet the President Biden's decarbonization goal.

We look forward to commenting on a Draft EIS for the Cumberland Plant that fully addresses these concerns. In the meantime, please contact us should there be any further information we can provide.

The National Park Service (NPS) has reviewed the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) notice of intent (NOI) to prepare an environmental impact statement (EIS) in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to assess the impacts associated with the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) located in Cumberland City, Stewart County, Tennessee, approximately 22 miles southwest of Clarksville, Tennessee, and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired CUF generation.

TVA has requested comments concerning the scope of the EIS and environmental issues that should be addressed in the EIS and is requesting data, information, and analysis relevant to the proposed action from federal agencies like the NPS and others.

In addition to the no action alternative (continuing to operate CUF), TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the EIS:

- A. Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the CUF reservation, which would require construction of a natural gas pipeline;
- B. Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations in Johnsonville, Gleason, or Lagoon Creek, Tennessee, and/or Southaven or Kemper, Mississippi; and
- C. Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations to be determined in Middle Tennessee.

Connected actions, such as the natural gas pipeline associated with the CC plant and transmission upgrades, will also be considered in the EIS.

NPS has identified several areas of jurisdiction or special expertise that may be affected by the project. However, it is difficult to understand the full scope of the proposed project areas, and any potential effects of the project on NPS resources or areas of special expertise, from the project location descriptions provided in the NOI and other information on TVA's project website. Additional information regarding associated infrastructure development, such as transmission upgrades and roads, was not included in the NOI or the project website. Finally, the distributed nature of Alternative C, which includes many (20+) solar and storage facilities within Middle Tennessee at locations to be determined, makes it difficult to understand the potential effects of these facilities.

NPS has identified the following resources of interest that could be affected by the project based on the information available to date.

#### *Nationwide Rivers Inventory*

Yellow Creek and Jones Creek, which are listed on the Nationwide Rivers Inventory (NRI) administered by the NPS, may be crossed by the natural gas pipeline that is part of Alternative A. Geospatial data for the NRI can be located at the following link:

NRI river segments are potential candidates for inclusion in the National Wild and Scenic River System. Under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act section 5(d)(1) and related guidance, all federal agencies must seek to avoid or mitigate actions that would adversely affect one or more NRI segments.

#### *National Historic Trails*

Johnsonville, TN, one of the Alternative B Preliminary CT Sites, is within one mile of the Water Route of the Trails of Tears National Historic Trail (NHT) and within 1.5 miles of the Benge Route of the Trail of Tears NHT.

The Reynoldsburg Ferry Site within the community of Johnsonville is a high potential site associated with the Trail of Tears NHT.

A high potential site is defined in the National Trails System Act as, "those historic sites related to the route, or sites in close proximity thereto, which provide opportunity to interpret the historic significance of the trail during the period of its major use" (P.L. 90-543, as amended through P.L. 116-9, March 12, 2019).

There are several routes of the designated alignment of the Trail of Tears NHT within the boundary depicted in the project map for Alternative C, the Potential Solar and Storage Plants. The geospatial data for the designated alignment of the Trail of Tears National Historic Trail can be located at the following link:

#### *National Register of Historic Places*

Our initial review indicates that Henry Hollister House, a National Register (NR)-listed property, appears to be within the CUF reservation. Also, the Richard C. Napier House, Promise Land School, and Nesbit Place Farm are all NR-listed properties that could be affected by the natural gas pipeline that is part of Alternative A.

Many other NR-listed properties exist within the areas potentially affected by the project, and the NOI does not address the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). TVA should complete the required steps under NHPA Section 106 in its analysis for the project, in particular, the identification of historic properties.

*National Heritage Areas*

Portions of the project would be located within the Tennessee Civil War National Heritage Area (NHA).

At this time, based on the information available, NPS does not anticipate requesting cooperating agency status under NEPA for this project. However, as we are unsure whether or not there will be impacts to NRI rivers, the Trail of Tears NHT, National Register properties, and Tennessee Civil War NHA or other resources where we may have jurisdiction or special expertise, the NPS would appreciate continued engagement on this project so that we may more thoroughly review project specifications as they become available and alert TVA to any potential issues at the earliest possible time. We also may find upon further review that it may be appropriate for the NPS to be a consulting party under NHPA. Therefore, please ensure that potential impacts to NRI rivers, the Trail of Tears NHT, National Register properties, and the Tennessee Civil War NHA are addressed in your analyses regarding the project, and that we are included in any applicable future correspondence.

We look forward to our continued collaboration on this project. Please let us know if we can supply you with copies of the congressionally designated alignment of the NHT or any other information for use in your analysis. 1. I first believe that TVA's request for input is misleading in the stated "proposed retirement of Cumberland Fossil Plant." It seems that only the burning of coal is to be retired and that the plant is to continue to operate as a gas fired facility.
2. It appears that the reason for abandoning coal is to a large extent based on the higher CO2 emissions from coal as opposed to the burning of natural gas. This in turn is based on the theory that increased CO2 in the earth's atmosphere is causing detrimental changes to weather. I believe that the science is not settled on this issue and to make such a drastic abandonment of a major fossil fuel facility is dangerous for our country. The environmental impact study should fully explore the potential benefits as well as negative impacts of increased CO2 concentrations from coal versus gas.
3. The United States is a coal rich country and the abandonment of coal by TVA will negatively impact the coal industry. This is coming at a time when other countries are expanding generation of electricity by coal combustion. Abandonment of coal will also affect the barge transportation industry. The future loss of these industries should be thoroughly addressed by the environmental impact study.



4. The Cumberland Fossil Plant is currently not served by adequate natural gas pipelines to be able to operate as a gas burning facility. The Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company, LLC has proposed a 32 mile pipeline coming from the south and parrelling the existing 500 KV line from Cumberland City. This is a major undertaking that will have significant environmental impacts and is directly caused by TVA's action. **The impacts of this pipeline must be addressed as part of the TVA environmental impact study, and not left to Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company to perform.** This study should include:
- a. The amount of carbon released by destroying 32 miles of forest along the pipeline corridor easement.
  - b. The amount of carbon which could be sequestered in the future if the pipeline corridor easement was allowed to grow to mature forest.
  - c. The amount of CO2 produced from the energy used to clear the pipeline easement, manufacture the pipe, excavate the trench, and install the pipe.

Today TVA submitted notice of its intent to file an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the retirement of the Cumberland Fossil Plant in Cumberland City, Tennessee. Through the upcoming EIS process, TVA will identify the timeline to retire the plant's two coal units and if any replacement generation is needed.

This is an opportunity for TVA to show that it is listening to the people of the Tennessee Valley when they ask for clean technologies such as solar power and battery storage. Cumberland is one of the nation's largest and most polluting coal plants, releasing over 8 million tons of carbon pollution into the air each year. It makes no environmental or economic sense to keep running this polluter for another decade, and it certainly makes no sense to replace it with methane-leaking, CO2-emitting gas plants. TVA must transition from Cumberland to clean energy as quickly as possible -- to protect the health of our communities, provide jobs and economic growth in the Valley, and ensure TVA's leadership in the clean energy economy.

In his April 29 remarks on his first 100 days, President Joe Biden reiterated his commitment to moving the U.S. past fossil fuels to clean energy. In recommitting to the Paris Climate Agreement, President Biden reasserted that all eyes are on America to lead again.

Support is expressed for TVA's efforts to achieve a coal-free energy supply, but the timeline here is critical. The president has called on the country to reach 100 percent carbon-free energy generation by 2035.

The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is in receipt of and has reviewed the subject document in accordance with Section 309 of the Clean Air Act and Section 102(2)(C) of the National Environmental Policy Act. The EPA understands that TVA is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired generation. To recover the generation capacity lost from retirement of one CUF unit, TVA is proposing the addition of approximately 1,450 MW of replacement generation. Replacement generation for the second retired CUF unit would likely consist of some combination of gas, solar, and storage, but the planning for that generation can be deferred to allow more time to assess the specific types and locations of that generation. These actions are intended to address TVA's aging coal fleet, which is among the oldest in the nation.

Based on our review of the scoping documents and participation in the virtual scoping public meeting on May 27, 2021, it appears that the proposed improvements are reasonably consistent with the current land use of the Cumberland facility.

Alternatives Considered: Under this action TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the proposed EIS:  
(A) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the same site;  
(B) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations;  
(C) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations.

The EPA has the following comments:

Although these or other alternatives are reasonable, some alternatives may warrant further consideration under NEPA and should be determined in the preparation of this EIS. Please use the NEPAAssist tool (<https://www.epa.gov/nepa/nepassist>) and other more localized information when conducting the NEPA analysis.

NEPAssist combines multiple Geographic Information System (GIS) and internet databases to help screen for environmental concerns.

**Water Quality:** This proposed action has the potential to disturb a considerable amount soil. A state or county construction stormwater permit will be required before construction can begin. Construction may impact nearby Cumberland River or other surface water bodies and best management practices should be applied to protect these water bodies before and after construction. Outfall monitoring and sampling should be analyzed alongside the impairment status of water bodies since base outfalls contribute to impairments.

**Air Quality:** This project site is within an attainment area for air quality standards, however localized impacts to air quality could occur during demolition and construction due to equipment exhaust emissions and fugitive dust. The EPA recommends implementing measures to reduce dust, diesel emissions, such as switching to cleaner fuels, retrofitting current equipment with emission reduction technologies, repowering older engines with newer cleaner engines, replacing older vehicles, and reducing idling through operator training and/or contracting policies. We also encourage controlling fugitive dust by watering or the application of other engineered controlled methods.

**Environmental Justice:** Consistent with Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations (<https://www.epa.gov/laws-regulations/summary-executive-order-12898-federal-actions-address-environmental-justice>), please ensure protected populations are not disproportionately or adversely impacted by the project. We also promote compliance with Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency, if applicable. Please consider using the EJSCREEN tool (<https://www.epa.gov/ejscreen>) as part of the NEPA analysis. EJSCREEN combines environmental and demographic data to help determine environmental justice concerns that are integral to the NEPA process.

**Energy and Recycling:** Efforts should be made to divert any recyclable materials such as concrete, steel and asphalt away from landfills and repurpose the material instead. The appropriate NEPA document should also address potential environmental impacts to construction workers, to include the hazards of demolishing the older structures, such as from lead and asbestos latent materials. Project management should consider sustainable building practices that utilize variable forms of proven renewable energy for the proposed project, for example, solar power for supplemental electricity and lighting for the, parking lots, or special buildings that may be proposed in the various projects. Our nieces, nephews, and their children will be around long after we are gone, and we firmly believe that if carbon emissions are not drastically reduced within the next few years, they will inherit increasingly serious problems as a result of climate change.

In making the decision to retire its five remaining coal-fired plants, TVA has the opportunity to demonstrate strong environmental leadership instead of lagging behind, during this most critical time in our nation's (and our planet's) history. I strongly urge that TVA embrace low-cost, clean energy options such as energy efficiency, solar, and storage instead of building more fossil fuel infrastructure.

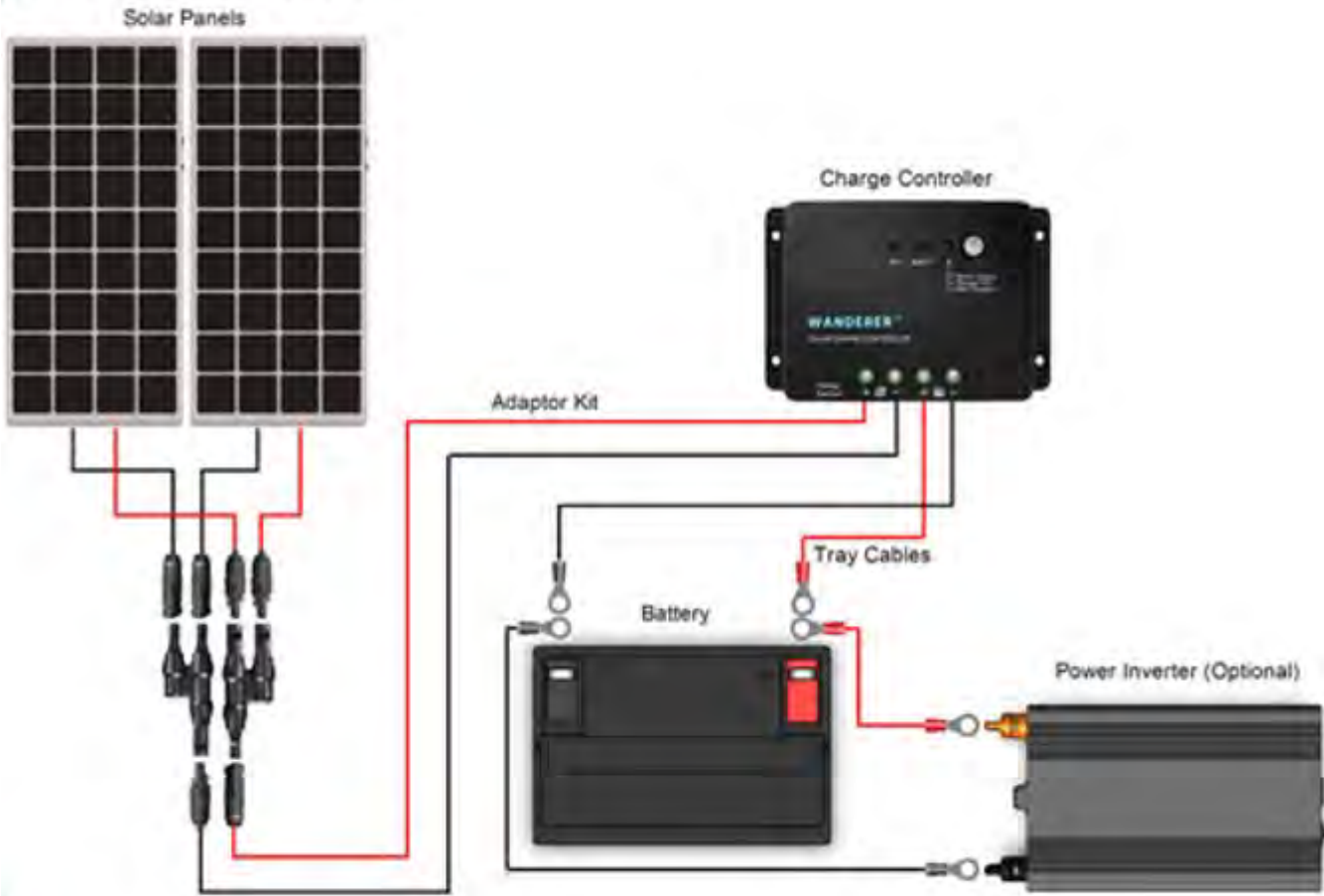

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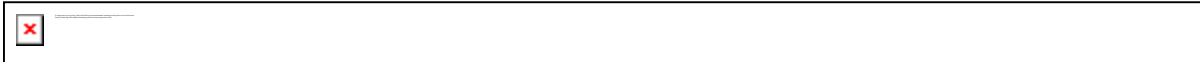

## **Target of achieving 20% ethanol blending in petrol has been preponed to 2025**

While India continues to price fossil fuels higher through excise, cess, and other forms of taxation, it must also take measures to encourage the availability of environmentally friendly fuels. The movement towards electric vehicles is not necessarily as environmentally friendly as many take for granted, given the need for rare elements in batteries, pollution caused in manufacturing, recycling, and disposing them, and also the current dependence on coal power to power them. A better alternative is the greater use of biofuels. Thankfully, the government has speeded that up and is now aiming at increasing the use of biofuels through a 20 per cent blending of ethanol in petrol by 2025. Great initiative and on the right track.

Many are going to protest for sure, and some vehicle companies will have a difficult time as greater ethanol may reduce fuel efficiency, increased wear and tear of the

engine, and may require some adjustments to some types of petrol engines. All of that notwithstanding, the costs of such change are low and the benefits high in terms of increased incomes for farmers, lower forex outflow, and lower net carbon emissions. The last because with biofuels, whatever is released into the atmosphere is eventually absorbed back as the next crop grows.

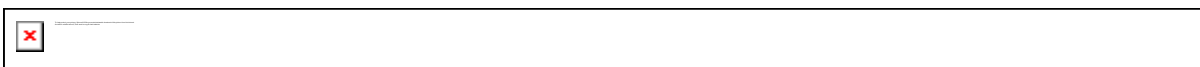


### **IMD, Skymet differ on monsoon arrival: A look at reasons behind divergent statements by two agencies**

This lack of regulation, monitoring, and enforcement of battery recycling needs to be addressed now. Or we will create a new polluter that is 'too big to regulate'.

If the government wants to benefit consumers, the environment, and the farmers, it needs to facilitate and support the development of an efficient logistical network that can get agricultural produce to the consumer while it is still fresh, rather than go through the processing route. As for Maggi lovers, the addition of some artificial vitamins in instant noodles will not necessarily make it that much healthier.

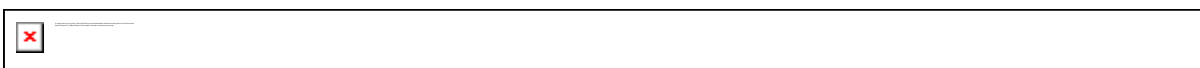


## **Reliance Industries sees big opportunity in global consensus against climate change**

Dear Ms. Pilakowski:

The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is in receipt of and has reviewed the subject document in accordance with Section 309 of the Clean Air Act and Section 102(2)(C) of the National Environmental Policy Act. The EPA understands that TVA is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired generation. To recover the generation capacity lost from retirement of one CUF unit, TVA is proposing the addition of approximately 1,450 MW of replacement generation. Replacement generation for the second retired CUF unit would likely consist of some combination of gas, solar, and storage, but the planning for that generation can be deferred to allow more time to assess the specific types and locations of that generation. These actions are intended to address TVA's aging coal fleet, which is among the oldest in the nation.

Based on our review of the scoping documents and participation in the virtual scoping public meeting on May 27, 2021, it appears that the proposed improvements are reasonably consistent with the current land use of the Cumberland facility.

Alternatives Considered: Under this action TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the proposed EIS:  
(A) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the same site;  
(B) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations;  
(C) Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations.

The EPA has the following comments:

Although these or other alternatives are reasonable, some alternatives may warrant further consideration under NEPA and should be determined in the preparation of this EIS. Please use the NEPAAssist tool (<https://www.epa.gov/nepa/nepassist>) and other more localized information when conducting the NEPA analysis.

NEPAssist combines multiple Geographic Information System (GIS) and internet databases to help screen for environmental concerns.

**Water Quality:** This proposed action has the potential to disturb a considerable amount soil. A state or county construction stormwater permit will be required before construction can begin. Construction may impact nearby Cumberland River or other surface water bodies and best management practices should be applied to protect these water bodies before and after construction. Outfall monitoring and sampling should be analyzed alongside the impairment status of water bodies since base outfalls contribute to impairments.

**Air Quality:** This project site is within an attainment area for air quality standards, however localized impacts to air quality could occur during demolition and construction due to equipment exhaust emissions and fugitive dust. The EPA recommends implementing measures to reduce dust, diesel emissions, such as switching to cleaner fuels, retrofitting current equipment with emission reduction technologies, repowering older engines with newer cleaner engines, replacing older vehicles, and reducing idling through operator training and/or contracting policies. We also encourage controlling fugitive dust by watering or the application of other engineered controlled methods.

**Environmental Justice:** Consistent with Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations (<https://www.epa.gov/laws-regulations/summary-executive-order-12898-federal-actions-address-environmental-justice>), please ensure protected populations are not disproportionately or adversely impacted by the project. We also promote compliance with Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency, if applicable. Please consider using the EJSCREEN tool (<https://www.epa.gov/ejscreen>) as part of the NEPA analysis. EJSCREEN combines environmental and demographic data to help determine environmental justice concerns that are integral to the NEPA process.

**Energy and Recycling:** Efforts should be made to divert any recyclable materials such as concrete, steel and asphalt away from landfills and repurpose the material instead. The appropriate NEPA document should also address potential environmental impacts to construction workers, to include the hazards of demolishing the older structures, such as from lead and asbestos latent materials. Project management should consider sustainable building practices that utilize variable forms of proven renewable energy for the proposed project, for example, solar power for supplemental electricity and lighting for the, parking lots, or special buildings that may be proposed in the various projects. The TVA should upgrade its CUF unit to continue to operate it as a coal-fired electric generating facility, and explore the use of woody pellets to co-fire with coal.

If the CUF unit is changed to a natural-gas fired unit, then it would be beholden to 1 or 2 pipelines, and thus would not be able to provide the same level of service redundancy and continuity of operations that coal-fired operations provide. As we've recently seen, our nation's economy and infrastructure cannot rely solely on pipelines to provide reliable, continuous service; especially when there are only a handful of them in place, and the construction of new pipeline capacity has been curtailed due to regulatory burdens and/or litigation liability.

Electric generation, fuel delivery, and energy production must come from 'all of the above' options. It is short-sighted to abandon a ready-available, proven and reliable fuel source as coal. A coal-fired operation can be supported by multiple coal mines located in diverse locations, in multiple states and regions; thus negating localized impacts from weather or other factors that may shut-down 1 or 2 mines. In that scenario, coal can be supplied by another mine. Similarly, coal can be delivered via multiple alternative rail routings or barge routes, should 1 rail line or barge route be flooded or otherwise go out-of-service for some reason.

The EIS should include an assessment of the environmental suite of impacts related to additional hydraulic fracturing that would be needed to supply the incremental volume of gas required to operate the CUF, the subsequent release of methane into the atmosphere, impacts of flaring operations at gas wells, and impacts on water usage and wastewater discharges. The EIS should also consider the potential impacts that would result if the CUF was not operable due to lack of gas supply from disruption, weather, threats, or malfunction; in other words, what environmental consequences would result because of a lack of electricity to wastewater treatment plants, and other environmental pollution control systems of TVA's customers.

The EIS should also include options of incorporating renewable woody-biomass fuel as a co-firing option with coal. There is an abundance of forest in the TVA service area that are in desperate need of thinning and regeneration harvest, to sustain healthy forest conditions. Fuel biomass wood pellets provide an incremental and sustained market for timber that would allow private forest landowners to keep their lands in forests, and in a well managed condition. Using timber as a co-firing fuel with coal would also help to support job retention in the TVA's service area, as opposed to importing natural gas from outside the region.

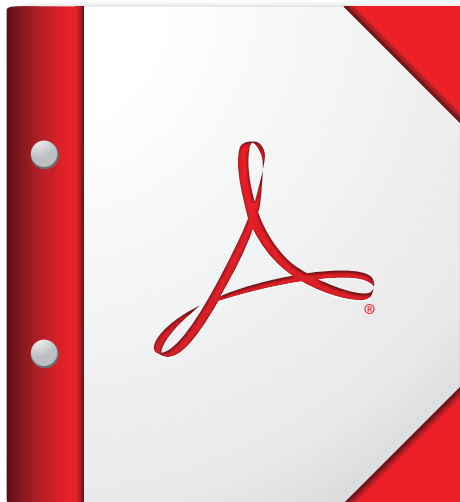

Dear Ms Pilakowski:

I very much appreciate, and thank TVA, for the announced closure of the Cumberland (and other coal-plant) units, wishing that this could come about even sooner than the anticipated 2033-2035 time frame. In the last dozen years or so, nearly 300 coal-based plants have closed across the country as the need to decarbonize our economy has become urgent. I am glad that my utility, too, is joining the national trend in retiring these high-carbon power plants.

I am disappointed however that the proposed plan for capacity replacement – as stated in action Alternatives (A) and (B) – involves natural gas plants, with only Alternative (C) giving consideration to renewable (solar) energy and storage facilities. At this opportunity point, TVA should not merely switch from a very damaging to a slightly less climate damaging fossil fuel plant. The plan, instead, should strongly emphasize energy efficiency and demand-side management while placing high investment in solar and other renewable and energy-storage options.

Personally, I have subscribed for more than 15 years to Green Power Switch, made additional investment in a solar-thermal unit for water heating and am on the waiting list, now, to receive photoelectric-power service from BrightRidge. Thus, for individual's use and as hundreds of towns, cities and states have already committed to carbon-free energy in the coming decades, I would have my TVA utility also heed the need of the time, not prolong climate-damaging fossil-based electricity.

Today, the founding act's language, that the TVA "foster the social and economic welfare of the people of the Tennessee Valley region" must be interpreted in light of the climate crisis, which threatens our future if not urgently addressed, as also in the national Administration's goals for reaching emissions-free electricity by 2035.

Even to benefit, as a rate payer, from the increasingly lower cost of renewable rather than fossil-fuel electricity and the price volatility inherent in the latter, I hope that TVA will to come to lead the

transition to renewables in electricity generation. Please change the currently outlined plan for capacity replacement in such manner, when the Cumberland and other coal plants are retired.

The National Park Service (NPS) has reviewed the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) notice of intent (NOI) to prepare an environmental impact statement (EIS) in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to assess the impacts associated with the proposed retirement of the two coal-fired units at the Cumberland Fossil Plant (CUF) located in Cumberland City, Stewart County, Tennessee, approximately 22 miles southwest of Clarksville, Tennessee, and the construction and operation of facilities to replace part of the retired CUF generation.

TVA has requested comments concerning the scope of the EIS and environmental issues that should be addressed in the EIS and is requesting data, information, and analysis relevant to the proposed action from federal agencies like the NPS and others.

In addition to the no action alternative (continuing to operate CUF), TVA plans to consider three action alternatives in the EIS:

- A. Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of a Combined Cycle Combustion Turbine (CC) Gas Plant at the CUF reservation, which would require construction of a natural gas pipeline;
- B. Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Simple Cycle Combustion Turbine (CT) Gas Plants at alternate locations in Johnsonville, Gleason, or Lagoon Creek, Tennessee, and/or Southaven or Kemper, Mississippi; and
- C. Retirement of CUF and construction and operation of Solar and Storage Facilities, primarily at alternate locations to be determined in Middle Tennessee.

Connected actions, such as the natural gas pipeline associated with the CC plant and transmission upgrades, will also be considered in the EIS.

NPS has identified several areas of jurisdiction or special expertise that may be affected by the project. However, it is difficult to understand the full scope of the proposed project areas, and any potential effects of the project on NPS resources or areas of special expertise, from the project location descriptions provided in the NOI and other information on TVA's project website. Additional information regarding associated infrastructure development, such as transmission upgrades and roads, was not included in the NOI or the project website. Finally, the distributed nature of Alternative C, which includes many (20+) solar and storage facilities within Middle Tennessee at locations to be determined, makes it difficult to understand the potential effects of these facilities.

NPS has identified the following resources of interest that could be affected by the project based on the information available to date.

#### *Nationwide Rivers Inventory*

Yellow Creek and Jones Creek, which are listed on the Nationwide Rivers Inventory (NRI) administered by the NPS, may be crossed by the natural gas pipeline that is part of Alternative A. Geospatial data for the NRI can be located at the following link:

<https://irma.nps.gov/DataStore/Reference/Profile/2233706>.

NRI river segments are potential candidates for inclusion in the National Wild and Scenic River System. Under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act section 5(d)(1) and related guidance, all federal agencies must seek to avoid or mitigate actions that would adversely affect one or more NRI segments.

#### *National Historic Trails*

Johnsonville, TN, one of the Alternative B Preliminary CT Sites, is within one mile of the Water Route of the Trails of Tears National Historic Trail (NHT) and within 1.5 miles of the Benge Route of the Trail of Tears NHT.

The Reynoldsburg Ferry Site within the community of Johnsonville is a high potential site associated with the Trail of Tears NHT.

A high potential site is defined in the National Trails System Act as, "those historic sites related to the route, or sites in close proximity thereto, which provide opportunity to interpret the historic significance of the trail during the period of its major use" (P.L. 90-543, as amended through P.L. 116-9, March 12, 2019).

There are several routes of the designated alignment of the Trail of Tears NHT within the boundary depicted in the project map for Alternative C, the Potential Solar and Storage Plants. The geospatial data for the designated alignment of the Trail of Tears National Historic Trail can be located at the following link:

#### *National Register of Historic Places*

Our initial review indicates that Henry Hollister House, a National Register (NR)-listed property, appears to be within the CUF reservation. Also, the Richard C. Napier House, Promise Land School, and Nesbit Place Farm are all NR-listed properties that could be affected by the natural gas pipeline that is part of Alternative A.

Many other NR-listed properties exist within the areas potentially affected by the project, and the NOI does not address the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). TVA should complete the required steps under NHPA Section 106 in its analysis for the project, in particular, the identification of historic properties.

*National Heritage Areas*

Portions of the project would be located within the Tennessee Civil War National Heritage Area (NHA).

At this time, based on the information available, NPS does not anticipate requesting cooperating agency status under NEPA for this project. However, as we are unsure whether or not there will be impacts to NRI rivers, the Trail of Tears NHT, National Register properties, and Tennessee Civil War NHA or other resources where we may have jurisdiction or special expertise, the NPS would appreciate continued engagement on this project so that we may more thoroughly review project specifications as they become available and alert TVA to any potential issues at the earliest possible time. We also may find upon further review that it may be appropriate for the NPS to be a consulting party under NHPA. Therefore, please ensure that potential impacts to NRI rivers, the Trail of Tears NHT, National Register properties, and the Tennessee Civil War NHA are addressed in your analyses regarding the project, and that we are included in any applicable future correspondence.

We look forward to our continued collaboration on this project. Please let us know if we can supply you with copies of the congressionally designated alignment of the NHT or any other information for use in your analysis. There is a classic argument. Solve energy problems or let them work them selves out. Paul Enrich vs Julian Simons. Initially, I feel like Paul Enrich's biologist point of view which claims growing populations present a catastrophic problem is the viewpoint that I agree with. I am a business major and I understand Julian Simon's economic point of view very well. The basic principles of economics state that the capitalist free market model naturally finds itself in equilibrium where supply and demand meet. Prices go up to decrease demand when supply is running short and vice versa when the supply of goods reaches too high prices go down to increase demand and consumption of the goods. Since the 1970's when Enrich and Simon made their bet, the way we produce and consume products has become more globalized and reliant on non-renewable recourses. There are millions of every day items made from single use plastics, which are disposed of instead of being recirculated as only 9% of plastic globally is recycled. Recycling itself cannot be the answer because the market is slowing losing demand. With China's increase restrictions on recycling purchases, how we can our economy naturally work this out without a major shift in our everyday actions? I agree with the circular economic model that must start with designing products to be disabled and recycled. Besides production and disposal of non-biodegradable goods how the growing population attains these goods is an even larger part of the problem. Transportation of goods accounts for the highest percentage of carbon dioxide pollution in the United States. Greta Thunburg is right. We have the technology, and we have the solutions, but what we do not have is action. Even in our own backyard, TVA is building coal production plants at the same time they are claiming to understand its pollutive effects and minimize its usage. It is not enough to use natural gas primarily for energy, minimize coal usage, and begin to explore solar and wind energy on a larger scale because the negative effects of the non renewable resource usage still persist. We must be one hundred percent committed



to sustainable and renewable energy sources. Like Enrich suggests, with our dependence of destructive resources to meet our basic needs and the continuously growing population, this can only mean that there will be a tipping point. How do we begin to solve this problem? We should begin that the source of our energetic needs.

The primary resource needed for all life is food. Currently food is produced in massive monocultures, which decrease the biodiversity of plants and animals. Because of the lack of biodiversity, pests increase. Our discontinuance of poisonous insecticides alone is not enough. Every year the gulf of the Atlantic Ocean is plagued by eutrophication from USDA approved insecticides that create organic pollution in our water systems. The list of problems goes on and on as pollution bioaccumulates through the food chain to our plates. Our problem is our disconnection from mother nature. We don't see the products we use on a daily basis being produced. The gasoline, corn, livestock, and plastics circulating in the economy are all produced in a way that increases global climate change in a variety of ways from soil depletion to water shortages. TVA's decision to remove Cumberland's huge CO2 footprint is commendable. Thank You! However, replacing its generation with natural gas would be both unethical and financially unwise. The Biden Administration has set a goal to reach 100 percent carbon pollution-free electricity by 2035, less than 14 years from now, while a new gas plant would be expected to operate for 30 years or more. The Administration will expect TVA as the largest public utility to set an example by leading the nation in carbon reduction. And that goal will likely require carbon pricing, which would make new gas uneconomic stranded assets. Public pressure, and thus political pressure for carbon regulation is rapidly growing. Polls find proposed carbon fee and dividend legislation popular, and it has already proven so in Canada, where it has been in place for some time. Given the imperative to meet the climate emergency, likely increases in the cost of gas, and likely carbon pricing, directly transitioning from coal to ever cheaper renewable energy and storage would save ratepayers at least millions, and would come with none of the headaches of burning carbon.

I fear replacing Cumberland's power with Small Nuclear Reactors would also likely be more costly. I also urge TVA to assist the communities that will be impacted by the plant's closure, including providing worker re-training and funding economic development initiatives.

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New gas infrastructure would expose the people and businesses in the Tennessee Valley to another polluting fossil fuel that is risky for our health and environment, our climate, and for customers.

I am writing to you regarding the newly proposed natural gas pipeline that will take 100' of my northside property. I understand that this is in efforts to retire the current coal-fired units at Cumberland Fossil Plant and replace them with natural gas. However, I wanted to take this time to address my various concerns with the project.

- The current 200' TVA 500 KV line that runs through our property had cleared just short of 5 acres of our land. The proposed pipeline would take another 100' making that roughly 7.5 acres of our land that is cleared and nearly unusable. The current TVA 500k line prevents us from being able to plant trees or build structures, allowing the spraying unwanted chemicals, and increased air traffic noise. Adding on the proposed pipeline also eliminates the ability operate machinery on that land.
  - For us, that is a small amount of land considering our neighboring fellow landowners that own a significantly larger portion. However, the impact is detrimental to our lifestyle and means of living.
    - **The impact study must address multiple gas pipeline routes in effort to accommodate those already suffering the 500 KV line burden on their land.**
- The United States is a coal rich country and the abandonment of coal by TVA will negatively impact the coal industry. This is coming at a time when other countries, such as Japan and South Korea, are nearly doubling the generation of electricity by coal combustion.
- I am also concerned that the deadline to reach out with concerns is June 11<sup>th</sup> and I have yet to receive my informational letter in the mail. My neighbor graciously lent me theirs giving me the chance to express my concerns.
